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A Long Story, Short

While still wet under the collar, my youngest son staring out into a crowd at my side, blurted loudly, "Mom, look at all these people and they have feelings and lives just like ours. How can that be... to the all of us?

1958 was a good year. I was the first born, to an eventual family of four brother's and a baby sister bringing up the tail end, my freshman year of college. This is how I cut my teeth on care giving, taking charge, and bearing much responsibility. My siblings might best describe that as.... overbearing, bossy and being a miss goodie two shoes! Ah...the good old days! In spite of contentious sibling rivalry, we cherish many great memories growing up together, and surviving each other!!

Fast forward to adulthood. A working wife and mother of two young boys, expecting a third, trying to balance it all. While relishing parenthood and with such positive hopes for the future, I felt at times overwhelmed, under prepared and wholly inadequate. Somehow these children of mine, survived me!

It was 1991 when I was laid off from my job with the state and became a stay at home mom. Somehow we were managing financially, yet I eventually wanted to contribute by working from home. That is when I started childcare for a family of two. Little did I realize it was the humble beginnings of a career now spanning over two decades.

By the end of 1992, my marriage had disintegrated and I was facing divorce and managing on my own. With my life in turmoil, I quickly started the licensing process to expand my work and income, as quickly as possible. Little did I realize that this would be the means for me to raise my sons and literally rebuild my life from the ground up.

In 1994, I relocated back to Douglas County, seeking the emotional support of extended family and the opportunity to start over. It literately involved purchasing a home that was uninhabitable, yet possessed lots of potential. Little did I realize it would morph into my crazy version of a 23 year fix and flip! Except.....I still live and work here!! Life very gradually went from barely surviving to thriving.

It was not an easy personal or professional journey by any means. The love and support of family made it possible. My work was crucial, and raising three sons paramount. Many times I felt overwhelmed, under prepared and wholly inadequate.

My home in Parker was first licensed in 1995, with very little furniture, no pictures on the walls, weeds and dirt in the yard, yet it possessed lots of potential. Children under my wing were regarded and treated as family, while concentrating on the basics...safety, health, growth and development, nurturing and fun. Pre-school was not part and parcel of my program except for informal learning. Professional mentoring from an early childhood educator in my family, and joining the DCCCA was instrumental in slowly building and establishing my child care business and program.

In 2005, I jumped at the opportunity to take advantage of a scholarship to attend college and obtain my director certification. Upon completion, little did I know..... my whole life experiences and this recent education, intertwined to change my total outlook and goals around childcare. I realized the magnitude of my work and my profound place, as an early childhood educator and caregiver! It became my passion, a ministry, a calling. Many times, I still feel overwhelmed, under prepared and wholly inadequate.

Those of us in this calling, each with our own unique stories and experiences, have built our programs from the ground up. We have seen countless changes through the years, in licensing, in family's, in children, in needs and expectations. How have we adapted and changed? What has helped and supported us? Do we value what we bring to the table? How do we advocate for our business, our children, our families? What particular challenges test our attitude and thwart our goals? Do we sense, acknowledge, and celebrate our own personal growth and development. At the end of the day, how do we take care of ourselves?

For today, please know your DCCCA remains dedicated to serving and representing you in a profession that has since come into the spotlight, yet is at times undervalued and misunderstood. We ask that you feel free to communicate and share with us. Perhaps give back and contribute to making our organization stronger.

Above all....laugh. Without stress, our life would be empty!! We are women, we are invincible, we are tired!

Good night.....sleep tight.


In the Spotlight

Identifying and validating of feelings

Asking open-ended questions

Talking with children - not at them

Speaking with the child at their eye-level

Encouraging problem solving

Using descriptive praise and reinforcement

Stating directives in a positive way

Offering choices, and respecting their choices

Children are warmly acknowledged upon arrival

Talking with the child about what is of interest to them, with a balance of child-initiated and adult-initiated conversations

Each and every child receives positive attention from the teacher throughout the day

Umbrellas:

Using cupcake liners, fold them in half. Poke a hole in the center of the crease in the liner to put the pipe cleaner through. Bend over the top of the cleaner so it wont come back through the liner, and fold up a hook at the bottom of the pipe cleaner to make a handle, glue onto blue paper. Have the kids make raindrops with blue paint & finger prints.

Name Flowers:

Cut a flower for each letter in the child's name.

Label each flower with their letters. Glue onto a pre-cut green stem and some leaves. **See pg. 15 for pattern of flower.**

Plate Umbrella:

Using a paper plate, have the children decorate the outside of the plate anyway they choose. Once they are done, "cone" the plate up and staple together. Push a pipe-cleaner through the middle top of the plate, roll over the end of the cleaner so it doesn't come out. Bend the bottom of the pipe-cleaner up to make a handle.



USING PURPLE BACKGROUND. CUT A STRIP OF GREEN PAPER, & FRINGE THE END TO APPEAR AS GRASS, GLUE ONTO THE BACKGROUND PAPER. HAVE THE KIDS GLUE THE CUT GREEN STEMS AND LEAVES ONTO THE BOTTOM OF THE STEMS. USING WHITE CIRCLES, MAKE A LOOSE CONE SHAPE OUT OF EACH CIRCLE, GLUE THE CIRCLE ENDS OVERLAPING TOGET HER, THEN GLUE ONTO BACKGROUND. MAKE A YELLOW MIDDLE AND GLUE TO CENTER OF THE CIRCLE.




Using a Fork & yellow paint, have the kids make a circle dipping the fork into the paint and Scraping it onto the white paper.



May Day Ideas (5/1/)

Have the kids bake some cookies.


Make this box from a regular paper plate and fill the box with the cookies. Tie a bow around the box and the kids can give it to their family as a May Day gift.

What you'll need:

Styrofoam or paper cup; Mini paper plate

1" wide strip of brown felt & 1/4" wide strip of both red and orange felt.

Acrylic paint in red and sunflower (tan/yellow)
Medium pom-poms in red, green, yellow, orange, white.

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Paint paper plate and Styrofoam cup with sunflower paint. Let dry and repeat. Paint the outer edge of the plate rim red. Let dry completely.
- 2. Hot glue the Styrofoam cup to the center of the paper plate to form your hat.
- 3. Glue the brown felt around the bottom of the Styrofoam cup (the edge that is touching the plate) to make the hat band. Glue the red and orange felt over the brown to create stripes.
- 4. Glue the pom-poms to the red edge of the paper plate, alternating colors as you go (green, white, red, yellow, brown, orange, green, white, etc.

EASTER EGG MARACAS

- 1. Get plastic Easter Eggs
- 2. Fill 1/2 way with rice or popcorn kernels
- 3. Put on the lid on the egg and using white tape, tape the egg in-between2 plastic spoons.
- 4. Decorate the tape with markers & shake away.

AND BLUE PAPER—MAKE SMALLER FOR FIREWORKS

PICK COLOR OF LARGE SHEETS OF TISSUE PAPER. THE MORE SHEETS OF PAPER YOU USE, THE FLUFFIER THE FLOWER WILL BE. BUT USE **AT LEAST** 3 PIECES.

PILE THE TISSUE PAPER ON TOP OF ONE ANOTHER EVENALY. THEN FOLD ACCORDIAN STYLE (LIKE IN A FAN).

FOLD THE FOLDED FANED STRIP IN 1/2 AND CUT THE EDGE AS DESIRED (SEE LEFT)

USING A PIPE-CLEANER WRAP
THE END OF A PIPE CLEANER
AROUND WHERE YOU FOLDED
THE STRIP IN THE MIDDLE AND
TWIST. UNFOLD PAPER.

ONE BY ONE TAKE 1 PIECE OF THE TISSUE AND CAREFULLY BRING IT UP TO THE MIDDLE, CONTINUE IN THE SAME MANNER UNTIL ALL PAPER IS SEPERATED. IF NEEDED TO MAKE THE STEM LONGER, ADD ANOTHER PIPE-CLEANER TO THE BOTTOM OF THE FIRST ONE AND TWIST.

Trace oval type shapes around both of the child's feet on to white card stock paper, give about 3/4 inch extra room around the feet. Place the white paper on a piece of square-like cardstock leaving a little bit of space (1 1/2—2" between the 2 feet and about 1" around the outside edges of the feet when child is standing on the paper for extra room.

Paint the bottom of the child's feet, and place them on top of the paper and press each foot down to get the best possible impressions.

When dry, add 2 strips of colored paper over the toes add a bead or small pendant to cover where the 2 strips meet at the toes, glue the other sides of the strip's down diagonally on the paper to look like a flip flop.

Using black paper (cardstock) works best). Make Fireworks using glue. Then use glitter to color the glue. The LET DRY.


These are very pretty, unless your child is old enough to work the glue themselves, you'll need to help. When using the glitter to sprinkle onto the glue, be sure you're watching close by with the little ones. As pretty as this turns out, its easy for them to get glue on their fingers, into the glitter then wipe their eyes, so please be care. Have fun.

June/4th of July



Using a piece of construction paper (8x12) fold in half long ways. Cut 1' stirp's from the fold edge to the open edges, stopping about 1 inch from the end of the unfolded edge. Open the paper, decorate as desired then roll into a cylinder shape and staple the ends together. Add about a 1 inch strip of paper as a handle.



Cut a star from card stock paper. Put glue all over the star and have children put square of tissue paper on top.


Using glue mixed with water and brush down the tissue paper let dry.
